We are excited to share our annual report for 2023. Your unwavering support and generosity have played a pivotal role in ASIA Families' success, and we are deeply grateful for your commitment to our mission.

Throughout the past year, ASIA Families remained busy and focused as the changes brought by COVID were finally in the past. Culture School and Camp Rice were back to their usual routines. In May we had a spring concert that featured the musical talents of several members of the ASIA Families community along with other musical artists. Our wonderful Korea Tour planning team conducted two Korea Bridge Tours which were a highlight of the year for the families and adoptees traveling to Korea.

Thanks to your support and generosity, we sponsored 7 adult adoptees to

join the summer Korea Tour and provided post-adoption services. We were able to award \$11,000 in scholarships to 11 young adult Korean adoptees (\$1000 each) between 2022 and 2023.

ASIA Families was recognized in two very important ways in 2023. Grace Song was awarded a Presidential Commendation by the President of South Korea, a very prestigious and well-deserved recognition. In the Fall of last year, ASIA Families was recognized as Best of 2023 Leesburg Virginia.

We hope you will enjoy some of the inspiring stories in this report from individuals whose lives have been positively impacted because of your generosity. These stories are a testament to the transformative power of your support.

As we look ahead to the future, we are committed to continuing our mission-driven work and making an even greater impact with your ongoing support. Your generosity fuels our passion and drives us to strive for excellence in all we do.




Where our Funding Comes From

In 2022, ASIA Families received support from 124 generous donors, whose contributions played a vital role in advancing our mission and supporting those in need.

Fast forward to 2023, and we are thrilled to announce a remarkable increase in community engagement. We welcomed 58 new donors in 2023 making for a total of 182, marking a significant 46.77% increase from the previous year. This surge in support demonstrates the growing momentum and commitment of our community to making a positive impact.

In 2022, we gratefully received donations totaling \$54,683, which greatly contributed to our programs and initiatives. This year, our total donations increased to \$85,611.65, representing an impressive 56.61% increase from the previous year. Our Programs

Korean Culture School

ASIA Families' Korean Culture School offers a unique opportunity for adopted individuals of all ages and backgrounds to deeply engage with the vibrant traditions and rich heritage of Korean culture. Through a diverse range of activities, interactive workshops, and cultural experiences, participants not only gain knowledge about Korean language, cuisine, music, and arts but also cultivate meaningful connections within the diverse Korean American community. The program is designed to involve the entire adoptive family, ensuring that while children attend classes, adults can participate in adult adoptee panel discussions or engage with adoption experts.

This inclusive approach fosters a sense of belonging and unity, encouraging families, teens, parents, adult adoptees, and community members to come together, share their stories, and celebrate their shared bonds of Korean heritage.

ASIA Families' Korean Culture School prioritizes creating a supportive and welcoming environment where cultural exchange thrives, friendships blossom, and a strong sense of pride in Korean identity is nurtured.

It's more than just an educational initiative; it's a place where meaningful connections are made and cherished.

Camp Rice

ASIA Families hosts Camp Rice Family Culture Camp annually in July, a three-day family sleepover event held in the greater Washington, DC area.

Camp Rice offers a range of tailored programs designed for children, teens, adult adoptees, and parents alike. Participants engage in a variety of activities including cultural workshops, outdoor adventures, team-building exercises, and traditional Korean games.

This unique camp provides a fun and immersive experience where families can learn about Korean culture while creating lasting memories together in a supportive and inclusive environment.

Korea Bridge Tours

Korea Bridge Tours, sponsored by ASIA Families, offer summer homeland trips to South Korea specifically designed for adult adoptees and families with children adopted from Korea. Led by Grace Song, these tours are crafted with her expert knowledge of the language, country, culture, and Korean adoption history and trends, ensuring participants have the trip of a lifetime. The tour provides opportunities for adoptees to delve into their roots and gain a deeper understanding of their identity. Many former participants have described the experience as life-changing. In 2023, ASIA Families sponsored seven adult adoptees for the Korea Tour, covering all of their ground expenses through your gifts and generosity.

Adult Adoptee Scholarships

Reconnecting with her gave me closure on certain aspects of my adoption as well as opened the door to a new relationship in my life."

"I struggled with my identity as a Korean adoptee growing up, and I want to support younger Korean adoptees as they go through that journey as well. "ASIA Families provided a safe space for me to explore my identity and connect with other Korean adoptees who were facing similar challenges. They provided significant insights on life and how other similar people dealt with what I thought was a "just me" issue.

For most of my life, I pretended to be someone who I wasn't. I lied and avoided questions that hinted at my background. Being with ASIA Families allowed me to be myself and find out why I hid from the world. It comforted me, and I felt safe from some of my problems.

After four years of being part of ASIA Families, I joined its volunteer program to help children in the same place as me. I believe that feelings of belonging and ethnic identification are crucial factors in forming a positive identity for adoptees like me. It wasn't just finding people with whom I related and was comfortable that made me who I am, but the experiences with these people that pushed me outside my comfort zone and forced me to confront my own identity and the societal expectations that came with it.

Some kids went through much more traumatic experiences than me, and I acknowledge that. In fairy tales, there's usually a happy ending or lesson to be learned. However, I found out the hard way, that sometimes there is no lesson or "ideal" ending. The journey of identity formation for transracial adoptees is filled with challenges and complexities.

I'm hopeful that perhaps I can help those younger who are just beginning their journey with the questions they have and the trauma they need to overcome. With any luck, I will ease their burden."
